## STATE UNEMPLOYMENT RATES BY AGE GROUP (2006)

This Fact Sheet presents information about the unemployment rates in each state by age group. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics defines the unemployment rate as the percentage of jobless individuals seeking employment out of the total labor force ([www.bls.gov](http://www.bls.gov)).

When examining the unemployment rates among people 55+, it is important to understand that “discouraged” workers might not be included in the unemployment statistics.<sup>1</sup> For example, some older workers tend to say they are “retired” even if they are also interested in finding a job. Therefore, the unemployment rates among older adults may be underreported.

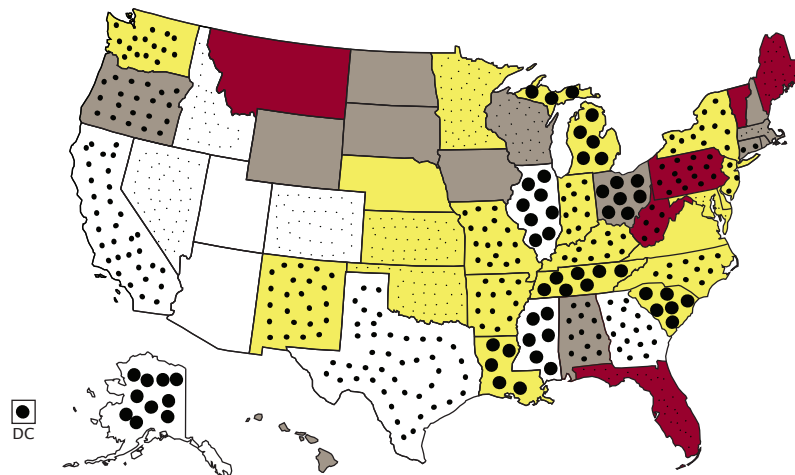
The unemployment rates in the table below reflect the annual unemployment rates in 2006. The overall monthly unemployment rates for each state can be found at: <http://www.bls.gov/web/laumstrk.htm>

The list is ordered from the highest to the lowest unemployment rates among people ages 55+ in each state’s labor force. In 2006, the unemployment rates among people age 55 and older were the lowest in Nebraska, West Virginia, Wyoming, North Dakota, and South Dakota.
